

About Us



As the heart of an AAU member University, the USF Libraries contribute to student success, faculty excellence, and lifelong learning for our community.




USF Libraries, St. Petersburg



2024-2025 Library News

Tampa Library Construction Progress

Construction on the Tampa library building, which is celebrating its 50th anniversary, began in March 2025 and is expected to continue through the year. This major renovation is focused on modernizing the building's front entrance to better accommodate its 1.5 million annual visitors.


The front entrance renovation includes:

- Storm weather resistance stormproof windows and doors will provide safety in severe weather events
- **Expanded egress** widening of entry and exit spaces
- Security upgrades E-gates will be installed to limit entry to USF ID holders
- University police presence a university police substation will be added to better serve the south side of the Tampa campus

A service desk will be located at the front entry to assist students or USF employees who have forgotten their IDs and to assist visiting scholars and community members. An added bonus of the increased security is that the data provided by the new E-gates can help identify peak usage times, allowing rapid adaptations to emerging use patterns.

In the near future, Nelson Poynter Memorial Library in St. Pete will begin similar renovations.

LINK AI Project


In 2024, Dean Todd Chavez issued an internal challenge grant to catalyze the Libraries' internal professional, technological, and leadership development to create highly innovative solutions that bring value to the USF community.

Two proposals to advance Al projects for the USF Libraries were chosen for support. One focuses on alternative metadata generation for collections and the other on access and discoverability.

The first project remains in development but the second, termed LINK, soft launched in spring 2025. The LINK project was designed to transform user interactions with USF Libraries by introducing an ethics-focused AI-powered chat reference bot. The primary goal of LINK was to enhance the availability, discoverability, and efficiency of library services while ensuring that the AI seamlessly coexisted with in-person patron support, reference services like Ask-A-Librarian, and traditional research support provided by library professionals.

LINK was built on Microsoft Copilot Studio, using a multiple method approach combining pre-designed conversation pathways and generative answers trained on a collection of knowledge documents and USF Libraries web pages. This approach was novel to the USF Copilot ecosystem through what was considered a "Citizen Developer" method. This required high commitment by members of USF Libraries but enabled a custom-built and dynamic model for the Libraries to work with directly.

Student and other testers were recruited for distributed student focus groups through the end of the spring semester. LINK Beta was launched on the Libraries' website on June 16th, where it currently resides. The LINK team presented about the project at the May 2025 Teaching and Learning with Al conference in Orlando.



Communications & Marketing

Through strategic awareness-building and engagement, the work of Library Communications & Marketing positively impacts student and faculty participation in Library programs, increases use of services for student and faculty success, and elevates the USF Libraries' profile both in the Tampa Bay community (research, funding) and in the broader academic research library field (research, AAU, ARL).

Social Media

A social media strategy was put in place in fall 2024, focused on targeted marketing and communications messaging with secondary goals of supporting library operations, sharing university messaging, and awareness-building edutainment/engagement content.

Impact

- 215,958 total impressions, 596% increase
- 6.81% average engagement rate, 19.8% increase
- 122,944 users, 112% increase



- 671 followers, 135% increase
- 57,401 reach, 1,100% increase
- 84,392 impressions, 1,500% increase

Website

A "redefine" of the USF Libraries website focused on UX design to provide users immediate access to the most requested Library services: databases, hours, printing, study room reservations, and requesting books and articles. This redefine also focused on highlighting strategic programs and services with better home page positioning and to update or archive out-of-date or irrelevant content (ongoing).

Impact

The result is crafting a better user experience for our 4+ million yearly users by providing direct access to primary information, optimizing the site for user experience, and the removal of unnecessary or out of date information that was providing inaccurate internal and external search results.

Communications & Marketing continued

Library Awareness Campaign

The goal of the "We've Got a Book for That" campaign was to increase awareness, and subsequent usage, of library programs and services. The initial iteration of the campaign ran in the fall 2024 and spring 2025 semesters and took advantage of all channels available, including social media, digital screens, web banners, print materials, and WOM.

Impact

Upon completion of the campaign, a QR code linking to a short poll was posted to digital boards in the Tampa library and to select social media. 37% of poll respondents reported that they had **seen the campaign**. Of these, 100% said the campaign **expanded their awareness** of the libraries' programs and services, and 40% noted they had **used new library services** because of the campaign.

eNewsletters

In order to proactively provide news and information to patrons and supporters, in FY 24-25, we created two new eNewsletters: a weekly newsletter for general Library news, launched January 2025, and a 3x/yearly newsletter specific to Special Collections, which launched in October 2024.

Impact

- 15,729 sends to a total of 1284 recipients
- 44 new subscribers
- Overall open rate 45.9% (industry avg. 25-30%)
- Overall Click Rate 2.4% (industry avg. 3-5%)

Workshops For Researchers Marketing

The implementation in spring 2024 of an iterative strategic marketing plan for Workshops for Researchers continued in FY 24-25.

Impact

- 192% increase in registrations, 198% increase in attendees (fall 2024, as compared to pre-implementation data for fall 2023)
- 22% increase in registrations, 22% increase in attendees (spring 2025, as compared to post-implementation data for spring 2024)



Digital Collections

Florida Rosenwald Schools Oral History Project

The Florida Rosenwald Schools Oral History Project, a collaboration with USF graduate student Ron Matus for his thesis, documents the experiences of alumni who attended Rosenwald Schools in the Bartow area during the Jim Crow era, highlighting the educational history of Black students during segregation.

The Gandy Collection of Commercial and Aerial Photography's growth over the last year has been exciting to watch! 70% of the photos have been edited and more than 63,000 lines of metadata are now complete. With over 23,000 photos curated and online to date, Gandy is already the Libraries' largest photograph collection with much more to come.

Tampa Through Time Portal - Map Overlays

In 2024-2025, Digital Initiatives added several new maps to its digital collections and georeferenced those maps into overlays for the Tampa Through Time Portal. You can now explore images in their spatial context and use a built-in slider to adjust map transparency to compare how the city has evolved.






Library Services

Physical Loans

As students are utilizing more digital resources, the USF Libraries have focused our efforts on increasing the accessibility of our physical collection to drive our circulation statistics.



The USF Libraries license access to a wide range of electronic resources, including academic journals, databases, primary source material, citation management, journal and citation benchmarking, research analytics tools, datasets, ebooks, and streaming media in support of USF's research, faculty success and student success goals, and teaching and learning objectives. Major ebook frontlist collections from Springer, Wiley, IEEE, and BAR Digital, updated or new titles on Slavic, Judaica and Soviet Cinema, and Medieval History, Oxford Handbook and Scholarship collections, select Choice and Awards list titles, as well as evidence-based ebook acquisition programs from Brill, Cambridge, Oxford, Taylor & Francis, De Gruyter and Proquest Ebook Central connect researchers to recent academic monographic content for all disciplines. Two journal packages were upgraded to models that added content, which included expanding Wiley content and all Nature journal titles. Through strategic investment of one-time funds, 12 Oxford Handbooks, 12 Oxford Research Encyclopedias, four Proquest History Vault modules, and six historical newspaper collections were purchased. Additionally, we now have the full run of the journal Nature back to volume 1.

Special Collections continued

Collection Highlights, Tampa

Tampa Special Collections accepted a small number of collections that built upon existing holdings in Florida Studies, Florida Environment and Natural History, local history, and the arts. New collections included the papers of William F. "Willie" Garcia, a West Tampa-based attorney whose political engagement generated an interesting assortment of ephemeral materials, and 10-plus years of USF's history documented photographically by University Communications & Marketing between 1999 and 2010.

Charlie Woods Collection

An assortment of photographs, glass negatives, periodicals, books, and artwork of Samuel Grimes, a birder and photographer. *Physical Collection*.

Court Transcript

A 1930s court transcript documenting the trial of Cuban emigrants celebrating the founding of the Soviet Union. *Physical Collection*.

Donna Parrino Ephemera

This collection includes materials documenting the USF Libraries' history. *Physical Collection*.

Florida Genealogical Society Records

Special Collections continued

Collection Highlights, St. Petersburg

USF St. Petersburg's Special Collections & University Archives received five donations in FY 2024-2025. Among the most notable were issues of Southwinds, a sailing magazine based on the southwest coast of Florida, and a collection of illustrated field notebooks from a zoologist named J.M. Valentine during his studies at Yale and expeditions to the Tortugas Islands in the 1920s.

American Merchant Marine Veterans Collection

USF St. Petersburg's first campus buildings were originally constructed as a training station for the U.S. Merchant Marines in the 1490s. After an exhibit commemorating this legacy, Captain Anthony "Dru" DiMattia, President of the AMMV, presented Special Collections and University Archives (SCUA) with an official "Battlin' Pete" World War II Merchant Marine Service Patch, a 40th anniversary U.S. Merchant Marine Challenge Coin, and a copy of the lyrics to the U.S. Maritime Service song. Gifted to recognize the Poynter Library for preserving the legacy of Merchant Marines during World War II, these items will be preserved in SCUA along with the rest of the USMSTS collections.




Bob Devin Jones/Studio@620 Digital Collection

J.M. Valentine Field Notebooks

Joseph Mason Valentine (1902-1994) was an entomologist, zoologist, and esoteric archaeologist who claimed to have discovered Bimini Road and the remains of the mythical city of Atlantis in 1968. While attending Yale University in the 1920s, he produced a series of field and class notebooks during his studies of vertebrate and invertebrate paleontology and morphology. The notebooks contain meticulous notes and detailed biological illustrations, as well as a diary with illustrated field notes from expeditions to the Tortugas Islands in 1925-1926.



Southwinds Sailing Magazine

Southwinds is a sailing magazine that originally focused on all things sailing in Southwest Florida. Special Collections & University Archives received a donation of magazine issues spanning 1994-2017.





Research & Instruction

Workshops For Researchers

Over **2,000 researchers** attended **134 workshops** in 2024-25 with two notable changes emerging from the previous year:

- The greatest portion of participants were Graduate students (43%), followed by Faculty (23%)
- Participation increased by more than double compared to last year's attendance.

During the course of the fiscal year, the **top five most attended workshops** were:

- 1. Intro to Generative AI For Research
- 2. NVivo for Qualitative Analysis: Introduction
- 3. Microsoft Copilot: Intro to Al Powered Research Assistants

Workshops By Researcher Type










Textbook Affordability

This chart tracks the average textbook cost per credit hour at the University of South Florida from Fall 2020 through Spring 2025, reflecting the university's ongoing efforts to reduce instructional material costs for students. Over this period, the average cost was reduced from \$24.04 in Fall 2020 to \$16.72 in Spring 2025, a 30.44% decrease.

This sustained decline demonstrates the long-term impact of the university's affordability strategies, including the promotion of Follett Access, open educational resources, and library-supported materials across high-enrollment courses.







Textbook Affordability continued

Since its inception, the Ebooks for the Classroom+ program has provided free access to required course materials for thousands of USF students, significantly reducing their textbook expenses. Between 2017–18 and 2024–25, the program has generated an estimated \$12,052,602 in student savings.

Between 2023–24 and 2024–25, the Ebooks for the Classroom+ (EB+) program saw substantial growth in both usage and impact. EB+ course enrollments increased by 46.6%, rising from 22,349 to 32,769, while student savings jumped by 73.4%, from \$1,391,644 to \$2,413,412. This surge reflects expanded faculty participation, improved outreach efforts, and a growing preference for library-provided ebooks as a no-cost alternative to traditional textbooks. The significant year-over-year increase reinforces EB+ as one of the university's most effective and scalable textbook affordability initiatives.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW & FISCAL EXPENDITURES

Tampa, St. Petersburg, and Sarasota-Manatee campuses

Overview

In alignment with the mission of the University of South Florida and the USF Libraries, the Libraries have continued to deliver high-impact services and resources to the university and broader community. Throughout fiscal year 2024–2025, the Libraries strategically managed a total expenditure of \$21,990,570, drawing from a diverse portfolio of funding sources. These sources include Education & General (E&G) funds (which includes Carryforward), Sponsored Research Awards, USF Foundation funds, Research Initiative Accounts (RIA), Federal Work Study (FWS) funds, and Auxiliary Funds.

These resources enabled the Libraries to sustain and expand access to critical information systems, research tools, instructional services, and academic support infrastructure for the USF community.

Strategic Investments and Initiatives

Key investments this fiscal year included:

- Collections and Technology: Continued enhancement of digital collections, one-time strategic purchases to strengthen library resources and acquisition of new imaging equipment for both the Library and the USF Herbarium.
- Personnel: Recruitment and retention of library staff, including the appointment of Dr. Chris Kiahtipes as the new Herbarium Curator, overseeing the full transition of the Herbarium collection and operations to the USF Tampa Library.
- **Research and Innovation**: Support for two internal AI Grant awards
- **Preservation and Access**: Advancement of the Florida Environment & Natural History (FLEHN) collection and archives project, including installation of new storage systems, funding for student assistants, and acquisition of archival materials to preserve culturally and historically significant records.

These initiatives were made possible through a combination of recurring and one-time university support, as well as the strategic use of Foundation Endowments.

Looking Ahead

The financial outlook for FY 2025–2026 remains optimistic, with projected expenditures of \$22,772,826. This increase reflects:

- Rising annual costs for library resources.
- Planned hiring of a dedicated Psychology Librarian.
- Refreshed student seating areas.
- Continued support for the Integrated Research and Impact Services (formerly the Broader Impacts Team).

To further advance strategic goals, the Libraries will actively pursue external funding through grants, philanthropic contributions, and collaborative partnerships.

The USF Libraries remain committed to excellence, innovation, and service—ensuring that the academic and research needs of the university and its community are met with the highest standards.



FY 24-25, Actual Expenses by Category








